What is Bank@Post?



When you **Bank@Post**, you do your banking at a Post Office.



There are over 80 banks where you can Bank@Post.

When you Bank@Post, you can:



• take money out of your bank account



• put money into your bank account



 find out how much money is in your bank account.



You need to have your bank card to Bank@Post.



But Bank@Post might let you use a **passbook**.



A passbook is a paper book that helps people keep track of their bank account.

You can use your passbook to:



• take money out of your bank account



• put money into your bank account.

Bank@Post might also let you move your money:



- out of one bank account
- into another bank account.

Why is Bank@Post important?

Bank@Post lets everyone in Australia use banking services when they:



• don't live close to a bank



• want to get their mail at the same time.

You can pay bills too.

You might pay your bills for:



• electricity



water



• gas



• the internet.

- your notes for coins.
